

## A CLOSER LOOK: WHY DOWNING STREET?



There has been a lot of talk recently about who will be occupying 10 Downing Street. Home of British prime ministers since 1735, there is more to this house than first meets the eye.

This terraced street was originally built in 1684 by a politician called George Downing. Hoping to make as much money as possible, the houses were built cheaply on boggy ground. The Countess of Lichfield, who lived in a large house behind the street, was very annoyed that this new street was overlooking her mansion.

In 1735, King George II gave the house as an official residence for the first Prime Minister, Sir Robert Walpole. However, he didn't move in until the house had been completely rebuilt to join up with the mansion behind it. The 10 Downing Street building that we see today is actually just a passageway to a much grander building.
