


A CLOSER LOOK: GENERAL ELECTION 2024



The UK's Prime Minister, Rishi Sunak, has called a general election, which will take place on 4th July this year. This means that until then, Parliament has been dissolved and is no longer running.

The general election will give adults across the UK the chance to vote for the party that they want to run the country. The UK is divided into 650 areas, called constituencies, and each of these chooses one Member of Parliament (MP) to represent local residents (constituents) in the House of Commons, Westminster.

After the votes have been counted, the King will ask the leader of the political party with the most MPs to become Prime Minister and to make a Government.


South Africa seeking coalition
