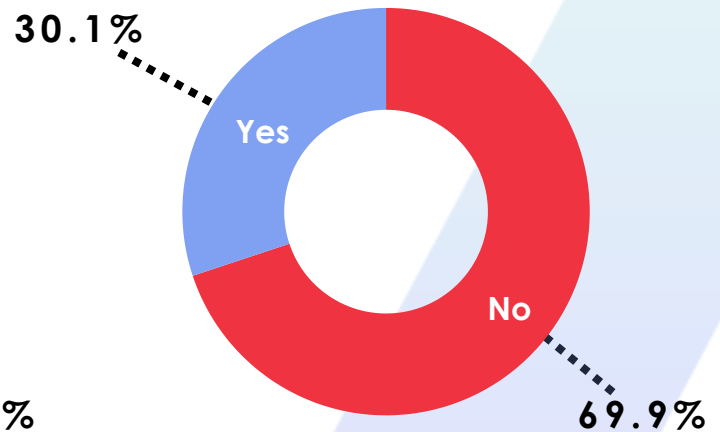
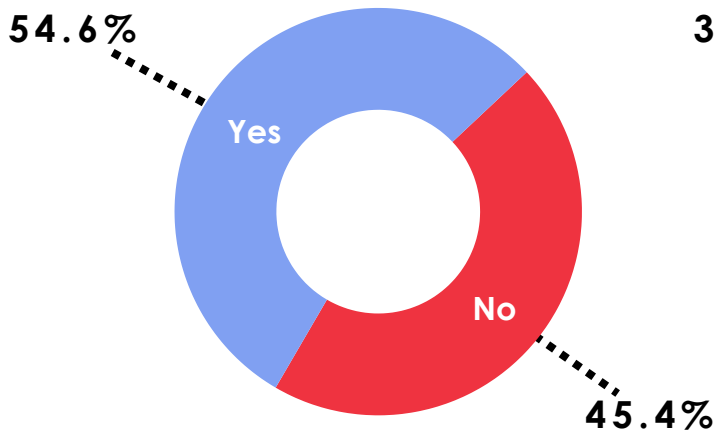

## A CLOSER LOOK: COCA-COLA'S SECRET RECIPE



In 1886, Dr. John S. Pemberton invented a drink that is now world-famous: Coca-Cola. He kept the recipe secret, only sharing it with a small group of people. They were so worried about people copying their recipe that they didn't write it down for 33 years!

The recipe was finally written down in 1919, and placed in a secret vault in the Guaranty Bank in New York. It has been moved to other secure locations over the years, before finally being kept under lock and key at the World of Coca-Cola in Atlanta, USA. Visitors to the attraction can have a go at recreating the taste of Coca-Cola using a virtual Taste Maker.

Many experts have pointed out that there are some not-so-secret ingredients in Coca-Cola that can be harmful to the human body, including sugar, caffeine and sweeteners.

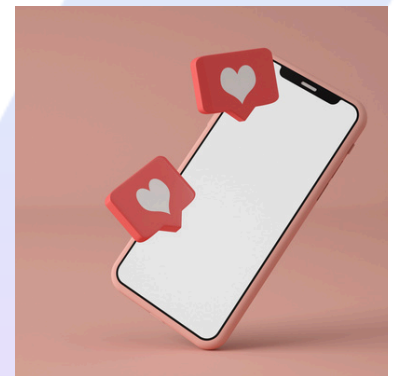
## All bets are off
