

# A CLOSER LOOK: HAPPY ANNIVERSARY



In 2013, the Marriage (Same Sex Couples) Act was passed. England and Wales. This law was a landmark moment for the LGBT+ community, as it gave any couple the right to be legally married. 2024 marked the ten-year anniversary of the first same-sex marriage taking place.

On 29th March 2014, the first same-sex marriage took place seconds after midnight between Peter McGraith and David Cabreza. Their wedding started with a party at 9pm in Islington Town Hall. The ceremony began at 11.30pm, and at midnight the registrar (someone who is legally allowed to hold a marriage service) was allowed to come into the building. They left at 12.20am - outside, there were lots of people and photographers ready to capture this historic event.
