Knowledge Know that Calypso music has a 4/4 time signature, Syncopated rhythms (displaced beats or accents so that the strong beats are weak and vice versa).a verse and chorus structure, simple harmonies and improvisation (on the spot). In Calypso music lyrics are political or topical and at one time people of Trinidad used Calypso songs as the main source of news, another feature is that it uses improvisation. Know that people of Trinidad were banned from playing their percussion instruments by the government of the time because the government wanted to suppress African culture. The people of Trinidad got around this ban by creating their own instruments to play Calypso music on, including steel pans. Know that a quaver is worth half a beat, but is often found as a pair to make up a whole beat. (Clapping 1 AND 2 AND 3 AND 4 AND - QUAVERS) Know that the pentatonic scale is a musical scale with five notes per octave (C, D, E, G, A) in contrast to the heptatonic scale, which has seven notes per octave.
